The classic Tragic Hero is well known in Shakespeare's plays. In Act I we meet the hero acclaimed and

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loved by his circle of friends and family, such as a Romeo, or a Hamlet. By Act V, after many character flaws that arise, the hero dies in disgrace. Who are the "American Tragic Heroes" ? Almost monthly, sensational media news reports expose brilliant men from political, religious, theatrical, and professional sports milieus that bring about their own ultimate downfall. We hear a report about the congressman that broadcasts an internet photo of his penis. There is the evangelical television minister caught with a hooker in his car, or the admired movie and television comedian charged with seducing women for years that he first drugged into submission. We hear the charges against a renowned football coach that for years sexually molested young boys. What do these 'tragic heroes' have in common? They all have fame, wealth, and innocent loving spouses, who share in the shame and infamy and are victims of a husband's basic character flaw. When I began a genealogical study of my own ancestors, I discovered a great uncle Daniel, and an uncle Herman, who followed the pattern of the American Tragic Hero, but in a less renowned way. They were heroes in their own families--brilliant and admired in their early years--attaining wealth and the respect of their wives and children.. However, through their own character flaws they ended their lives in disgrace and failure.

This book constitutes a new direction for feminist studies in English Renaissance drama. While feminist scholars have long celebrated heroic females in comedies, many have overlooked female tragic heroism, reading it instead as evidence of pervasive misogyny on the part of Shakespeare and his contemporaries. Displacing prevailing arguments of "victim feminism," the contributors to this volume engage a wide range of feminist theories, and argue that female protagonists in tragedies - Jocasta, Juliet, Cleopatra, Mariam, Webster's Duchess and White Devil, among others - are heroic in precisely the same ways as their more notorious masculine counterparts.

A history of the Vilna ghetto, focusing on resistance and on the Judenrat, and revolving around three persons: Yitzhak Wittenberg, the leader of the United Partisan Organization (FPO) in Vilna; Yechiel (Ilya) Sheinbaum, who led the Second Fighting Organization; and Jacob Gens, the head of the ghetto and of the Jewish police. Criticizes the strategic plan for a "last minute uprising" which was adopted by the FPO instead of the more promising strategy of escape from the ghetto and joining the Soviet partisans. With the surrender of Wittenberg in July 1943, the FPO lost its only able and resolute commander. Contends that there was no "Vilna ghetto uprising", but only the defense of the house at Strashune 6 on 1 September 1943; it was defended by Sheinbaum's organization and by unaffiliated fighters, rather than by the FPO. Ideological and political rivalries between different factions of the ghetto resistance precluded the possibility of escape and survival of many able-bodied Jews. Depicts Gens as a controversial figure, whose relations with the resistance were ambivalent; dismisses

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accusations that he was a Nazi collaborator or a leader drunk with power.

Long recognized as a core book in any study of Japanese culture and literature, *The Nobility of Failure* examines the lives and deaths of nine historical individuals who faced overwhelming odds, and, realizing they were doomed, accepted their fate--to be killed in battle or by execution, to wither in exile, or to escape through ritual suicide. The first two chapters of this book isolate and describe the literary phenomenon of the Sophoclean tragic hero. In all but one of the extant Sophoclean dramas, a heroic figure who is compounded of the same literary elements faced a situation which is essentially the same. The demonstration of this recurrent pattern is made not through character-analysis, but through a close examination of the language employed by both the hero and those with whom he contends. The two chapters attempt to present what might, with a slight exaggeration, be called the "formula" of Sophoclean tragedy. A great artist may repeat a structural pattern but he never really repeats himself. In the remaining four chapters, a close analysis of three plays, the *Antigone*, *Philoctetes*, and *Oedipus at Colonus*, emphasizes the individuality and variety of the living figures Sophocles created on the same basic armature. This approach to Sophoclean drama is (as in the author's previous work on the subject) both historical and critical; the universal and therefore contemporary appeal of the plays is to be found not by slighting or dismissing their historical context, but by an attempt to understand it all in its complexity. "The play needs to be seen as what it was, to be understood as what it is."

Academic Paper from the year 2013 in the subject Literature - Modern Literature, Masaryk University , language: English, abstract: The aim of this paper is to analyse the character of Jocelyn Pierston as a tragic hero. The paper focuses on two novels - "The Pursuit of the Well-Beloved" and "The Well-Beloved" - and is divided into two main chapters, while the latter novel is preferred. The first half of the work is dedicated to the Aristotelian concept of the tragic hero, its usage and the conditions for a protagonist to be labeled as such. In addition, some of Thomas Hardy's opinions on humanity, fate and nature will be shown and discussed with several sources, as well as his attitude towards tragic heroes. In the second half the main protagonist is thoroughly examined in both novels in order to find his tragic flaw and understand his character. By the analysis of various tragic effects depicted in the source texts the thesis tries to argue whether Pierston fulfills those conditions and is a tragic hero

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or whether he simply lacks the needed qualities.

In it, Aristotle offers an account of what he calls "poetry" (a term which in Greek literally means "making" and in this context includes drama - comedy, tragedy, and the satyr play - as well as lyric poetry and epic poetry). They are similar in the fact that they are all imitations but different in the three ways that Aristotle describes: 1. Differences in music rhythm, harmony, meter and melody. 2. Difference of goodness in the characters. 3. Difference in how the narrative is presented: telling a story or acting it out. In examining its "first principles," Aristotle finds two: 1) imitation and 2) genres and other concepts by which that of truth is applied/revealed in the poesis. His analysis of tragedy constitutes the core of the discussion. Although Aristotle's Poetics is universally acknowledged in the Western critical tradition, "almost every detail about his seminal work has aroused divergent opinions."

In opposition to the critical positions of new historicists and cultural materialists. This book reaffirms that Shakespeare's plays represent enduring truths of our emotional and spiritual life and that these truths help account for Shakespeare's continuing popularity.

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
